CURBSIDE COLLECTION ON WEDNESDAYS



Effective **July 1**, the Town of Franklinton will be moving to curbside garbage pickup. This means that by 6:00 a.m. on the morning of your garbage

pickup day, you will need to roll your trash cart to the curb of your street; once the trash has been picked up, you will need to roll your cart back. By moving to curbside pickup, the Town was not only able to return to curbside recycling, but also to reduce the monthly garbage fees charged to our residents. Also, Waste Industries notified the Town earlier this year that back yard pick up would no longer be available effective July 1, 2012.

If you feel that your cart is too large, and would like a smaller cart, please contact Town Hall and make that request. Town staff will request that you complete a short form to have a record of this request, and your new, smaller garbage cart will be delivered as quickly as possible.

For those residents who are physically unable to move their carts to the curb, backyard pickup will still be made available. If you are unable to move your garbage cart to the curb, it is **imperative** that you contact Town Hall as soon as possible to fill out the backyard request form. CURBSIDE RECYCLING BEGINS JULY 6TH

In the coming weeks, Franklintonians who utilize the Town's garbage ærvices will be receiving a green recycling cart. This new ærvice – curbside recyclape – will allow residents to recycle any recyclable material (except mercury bulbs – fluorescent bulbs) in **one container**. You will be able to combine cans, bottles, paper, plastic, aluminum – everything recyclable! This ærvice will be provided on a bi-weekly basis beginning on July 6th.

Because the Town is moving to curbside recycling, we will also in the coming weeks be removing the recycling containers in downtown Franklinton. We are excited about this new service, and hope that *all* our residents will take advantage of the opportunity to help protect our planet!



National Night Out 20 Years of Community!



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Franklinton is one of the 10,000+ communities that were involved in observing National Night Out in 2010. National Night Out is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watches and is an effort to heighten crime prevention awareness; generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs; strengthen neighborhood spirit and police community partnerships; and send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

The event began in Franklinton in 1992 with residents being encouraged to turn on their porch lights and come outside, while officers made visits to as many residents as possible. Participation was so overwhelming that "Block Parties" had to be organized so that officers could meet

UTILITY DISCONNECTION WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED

Most every resident in Town has a utility bill. For decades, the Town's policy has been that Town utility bills are due on the 9th of the month and are late after 5:00pm on the 9th of the month, and if not paid by 5:00pm on the 14th of the month, the customer's utilities are cut off. The Town has been lenient in the enforcement of its disconnection policv allowing customers until the end of the day on the 15th before cutting off their services. However, in order to fairly enforce the disconnection policy, all accounts that are unpaid at 5:00 p.m. on the 14th day of the month, or the next business day after should the 14th fall on a holiday or weekend, will be scheduled for disconnection. After 5:00 p.m. on the 14th payments will not be accepted in the after hours drop box. The next morning beginning at 7:00 a.m. all customers who have not paid will be disconnected and charged a \$50 reconnection fee in order to restore service. All utility accounts that are satisfied prior to 12 noon will be restored on the same day. All efforts will be made to restore service to accounts satisfied between 12 noon and 3:00 p.m. on the same day; however this will be dependent on the Public Works schedule and reconnection is not guaranteed and may be as late as 12 noon on the following business day.

Want an easy way to not have to remember to get your payment to Town Hall **and** save a little money on postage or gas? Use our bank draft service!

To set up automatic bank draft, bring a voided check to Town Hall, and fill out a brief form. The entire process will take less than ten minutes! It also makes paying your utility bill **much** simpler, because it will automatically be drafted from your checking account on the 5th of the month. So avoid the big lines! Set up automatic bank draft today!

Any resident **not currently** on automatic bank draft that registers for it before August 31 will be entered into a drawing for a prize pack including a \$25 gift card to Franklinton's WilcoHess station! The drawing will be held at the September meeting of the Franklinton Board of Commissioners!

OneFranklinton Announces Façade Grant Program



One of the major focus areas of OneFranklinton is the appearance of the streetscape along Main Street and in the downtown/uptown area. After three years of fundraising and the hard work of a subcommittee in developing guidelines and an application, the OneFranklinton Façade Grant Program is ready! Those who own properties in the historic downtown business district are eligible to apply for a 50% matching grant (up to a \$2,000 reimbursement) to replace, upgrade, or repair the exterior facade of their property. The grants will be awarded quarterly, with applications due mid-quarter on a rolling deadline basis. Remaining deadlines for 2011 are August 31, and November 30. Awards will be announced at the regular meetings of the Franklinton Board of Commissioners in July, October, and January following the application deadlines, and recipients will be notified by mail prior to the public announcements. Why does *OneFranklinton* host Movies on Main? Several reasons! Events like Movies on Main bring together our residents to create the sense of community for which Franklinton has long been known. Some folks come from other towns and other areas just to watch movies in downtown Franklinton! This brings visitors to see opportunities that exist in our historic downtown businesss district. It also provides our local downtown businesses the opportunity for new customers when they come to see a movie!

When programs aren't supported, they can't continue. These free opportunities are essential for families who can't travel to neighboring cities for family entertainment. Without your support and participation, OneFranklinton can't keep movies playing in downtown!

Water Restrictions??

Currently, the Town of Franklinton does not have any restrictions in place on water usage. (This is, in part, due to the nearly four inches of rain that has fallen since the first of June.) However, should the Town need to take steps to implement water restrictions, such actions will be publicized in several places. Both *The Franklin Times* and *The Wake Weekly* will be informed, and the Town will post a notice on our Public Access Cable Channel 10. Further, thanks to a tip from an active citizen, the Town has placed a Water Restriction Status on our website, and will keep it updated at all times.

The Town will **not** send a direct mailer to any resident or utility customer unless the Town finds it necessary to enact Stage III water restrictions. You can do your part to prevent water restrictions from becoming necessary by voluntarily conserving water. A few steps you can take to conserve water include:

- * When washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run while rinsing. Fill one sink with wash water and the other with rinse water.
- * Run your clothes washer and dishwasher only when they are full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Compost vegetable food waste instead and save gallons every time.
- * Wash your fruits and vegetables in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap.
- * Collect the water you use for rinsing fruits and vegetables, then reuse it to water houseplants.
- * If your shower fills a one-gallon bucket in less than 20 seconds, replace the showerhead with a water-efficient model.
- * Shorten your shower by a minute or two and you'll save up to 150 gallons per month.
- Put food coloring in your toilet tank. If it seeps into the toilet bowl without flushing, you have a leak. Fixing it can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Designate one glass for your drinking water each day or refill a water bottle. This will cut down on the number of glasses to wash.
- Use a water-efficient showerhead. They're inexpensive, easy to install, and can save you up to 750 gallons a month.
- * If your dishwasher is new, cut back on rinsing. Newer models clean (*NNO Continued from page 1*) more thoroughly than older ones.

EVERGREEN CEMETERY INFORMATION NEEDED

As you may know, just over a year ago the Board of Commissioners voted to begin maintenance at Evergreen Cemetery. Evergreen is currently a private cemetery adjacent to the Franklinton Elementary School playground, and is just outside Town limits. The cemetery was created over 100 years ago as a final resting place for our community's African American citizens. At that time, African American citizens were not allowed to be buried in Fairview Cemetery, the official Town cemetery. Since then, Evergreen, its plots, roads, and markers have all been maintained by a committee of volunteers who have for decades raised funds to maintain the cemetery. It is the goal of the Franklinton Board of Commissioners to officially make Evergreen Cemetery a Town cemetery effective January 1, 2012.

Do you own a plot in Evergreen Cemetery? Do you have relatives buried there? Please help the Evergreen Cemetery Committee and the Town staff in identifying those buried and those unfilled plots! It is **imperative** that we have as accurate and complete of a record as possible. Any plots not identified as owned by December 31, 2011 will show in the Town's records as unsold, and therefore, available for sale to residents. The current price for a cemetery plot in the Town of Franklinton is \$800. Thus, it is critical that we have the most complete record as possible.
