Mayor's Message....

It's FALL ! It feels like this year literally ran away! While the summer season was a nice one here in Franklinton, it generally pales in comparison to fall—and I hope the fall is a little more weather-cooperative with outdoor plans. We have a lot of exciting events planned for this fall and holiday season, beginning in just a couple of weeks!

It's nearly time for *Frankenfest on Main*! In our 7th year, this festival has truly become a labor of love for many, including myself, and we hope you'll come out and enjoy yourself. There will be crafters, games, local artists, regional art classes, performers, and of course, great food! I hope we'll see you there—and read on for more exciting happenings!

In the past several weeks, many of you may have heard differing versions of what's happening with our town's streetlights. Allow me to clear up some of that confusion. The Town of Franklinton is **not** removing all of our streetlights. Town staff and the Board of Commissioners are, however, examining how best to manage our community's streetlights—as they belong to the entire community, not any one individual or a particular property owner. In the past, we have not had any form of equity or uniformity as to where we place street-lights. Citizens in our community now spend (through their tax dollars) over \$60,000 on street lights—that's over six cents of the Town's property tax rate!

So, why now? Several reasons. In a separate mailer, we will communicate information about street lights, how the Town is looking at lighting for public safety, and what steps we are taking to ensure such while being as efficient and effective with your tax dollars as possible. Streetlights are **only** funded through your local tax dollars, and your Board of Commissioners feels an utmost responsibility to spend

Nominations

MERCURY BULB RECYCLING

Compact fluorescent lights (CFLs) and tube fluorescent lights (like those found in Town Hall and the Town Hall Annex) contain mercury, which is a dangerous element that can poison humans and animals with even the slightest of contact. While they are great energy saving products, proper disposal of such semi-hazardous material is key to ensuring a safe living and working environment. Currently, there are programs in our region for recycling mercury bulbs, including Home Depot's CFL recycling program, and Wake County's bulb site in Knightdale. However, there really is nothing of convenience to the citizens of Franklin County, much less Franklinton, which is what prompted the Town to create, for Town residents, a mercury bulb recycling program. This program does not require residents to pay an extra fee or a recycling fee, as many recycling programs do, and is easy to use.

Town residents who have CFLs that have burned out may bring them to Town Hall during regular business hours (M-F, 8:30am – 5:30pm;)

to be recycled. Please help us protect your living environment and the residents of our Town by correctly disposing of mercury based light bulbs and using this new Town service!





TRICK OR TREAT SAFETY TIPS

- An adult should accompany children at all times.
- Carry a bright flashlight
- Wear clothing and costumes with reflective tape or "Glow in the Dark" markings.
- Always WALK, do not run.
- Stay on the Sidewalks.
- If there is no sidewalk keep to the left side of the road.
- Trick-or-Treat only in familiar neighborhoods.
- DO NOT go to strangers' houses or cut across their yards and driveways.
- Visit houses that have lights on, especially houses with Halloween decorations.
- Always use the front door; NEVER go to the back of a house.
- · Stay away from any animals that you don't know.
- Always be polite and don't forget to say "Thank You."

those dollars wisely.

We're also looking at LED lighting as an option to help us do just that. Wondering what LED street lighting looks like? Drive down West Mason Street between Main Street and Hillsborough Street. Duke Energy Progress has provided us—free of charge—a 'test strip' of LED street lights, which cost about half of what the orange (sodium vapor) street lights do to run, and actually provide more light and give off less light pollution.

Interested in learning more? **PLEASE ATTEND** the Street Light Workshop on Monday, October 28 at 6pm at the Town Hall Annex, 5 W. Mason Street. Maps will be available to show you exactly where the lights are currently, where lights are being considered for removal, and relocation. This is your chance to be informed!

As you read this edition of *Community Notes*, you'll see that there are a number of activities going on in and around Franklinton in the coming weeks. Be sure and take advantage of these fantastic experiences that are right here at home!

HOW CAN I CONSERVE WATER?

You can conserve water (and reduce costs)! A few steps you can take to conserve water include:

- When washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run while rinsing. Fill one sink with wash water and the other with rinse water.
- Run your clothes washer and dishwasher only when they are full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Compost vegetable food waste instead and save gallons every time.
- Wash your fruits and vegetables in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap.
- Shorten your shower by a minute or two and you'll save up to 150 gallons per month.
- Put food coloring in your toilet tank. If it seeps into ۵ the toilet bowl without flushing, you have a leak. Fixing it can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Use a water-efficient showerhead. They're inexpensive, easy to install, and can save you up to 750 gallons a month.
- If your dishwasher is new, cut back on rinsing. Newer models clean more thoroughly than older ones.
