Bet you didn't know that it actually pays you back to shop locally. Didn't? Well, it does. See, when you shop locally, part of your sales tax comes back to the Town of Franklinton. Nifty, eh? Well, a lot of the sales tax you pay in some way come back to the Town of Franklinton. Here's how...

As you know, the majority of the Town's General Fund comes from real estate taxes. However, there are other pieces to the General Fund. (What is the General Fund? It's one of the three major 'accounts' you find in the Town's budget. From the General Fund, the Town funds the Police Department, the Administrative department (Town Hall staff), and Governance (the Board of Commissioners and other programs, like OneFranklinton).

The first comes from the taxes you pay for electricity, cable, and phone. A (very small) portion of those taxes come back to the Town from the State of North Carolina. These payments are based on a formula largely calculated from our population, and thus, how much we contribute to those taxes. These taxes usually bring about \$65,000 to the Town each year, depending on use and population.

Second, the Town receives a small allotment from the gas tax paid when you purchase gasoline. (This only comes from the part that is the state gasoline tax.) This allotment comes from a piece of state legislation known as the Powell Bill, and such funds are known by the same name. These funds are only able to be spent on streets and sidewalks within the Town. Thus, they are somewhat restricted. And now, hopefully, you can see why it's so important that we buy our gas in Franklinton whenever possible!

On Monday, October 31, OneFranklinton -Fine Arts will host our community's annual Pumpkin Carving Contest and Costume Contest. In the days leading up to Halloween, members of the Fine Arts program area will work with local schools and daycares to provide classes and individuals with pumpkins to be carved and put on display on Halloween. Pumpkins will be delivered three to four days prior to pick up on the afternoon of Monday, October 31.

Interested individuals not affiliated with a school in the Franklinton area may request a pumpkin to carve by calling Town Hall (494-2520) and speaking with Nikki May (extension 33); you will be given a pickup date and time when you call. There will be a limited number of individual pumpkins made available. (Please remem-

# **Curbside Trash Pick Up**

Effective **July 1**, the Town of Franklinton moved to curbside garbage pickup. This means that on Tuesday night or Wednesday morning, citizens should roll their trash cart to the curb of your street; once the trash has been picked up, you will need to roll it back. By moving to curbside pickup, the Town was not only able to return to curbside recycling, but also to reduce the monthly garbage fees charged to our residents.

If you feel that your cart is too large, and would like a smaller cart, please contact Town Hall and make that request. (Call 494-2520, x33) Town staff will request that you complete a short form to have a record of this request, and your new, smaller garbage cart will be delivered as quickly as possible.


Effective October 1, residences where garbage and

recycling carts have not been removed from the curbside by sunrise on Thursday morning will be in violation of the Town's ordinance regarding trash and recycling, and will be subject to a fine. Warnings will be issued only once per residence.



# **Curbside Recycling**

By now, you know that Franklinton has returned to recycling materials curbside. Now, you can recycle anything that is recyclable (except cardboard & mercury-based light bulbs) in **one** container that you can roll right to the curb! All recyclables can be mixed – paper, magazines, catalogs, plastic bottles, aluminum cans, plastic jugs, etc. – in your

# FRANKLINTON PARTICIPATES IN DEBT SET OFF PROGRAM

In the next couple of months the Town will start participating in the North Carolina Debt Setoff Collection Program. What is this program? Approved by the North Carolina Legislature for the purpose of collecting municipal delinquent debts, this program works by seizing North Carolina Individual Income Tax refunds and Education Lottery winnings of those who owe a debt to the Town of Franklinton (and thereby, its citizens), and have not paid it. These debts are not those that would be considered short term – these debts are seriously delinquent, sometimes two to three years old. Types of debt include unpaid utility bills, unpaid traffic citations and unpaid code enforcement citations. The Town's participation in this program will allow Town staff to work towards collecting outstanding debts owed to the Town.

### MERCURY BULB RECYCLING

Compact fluorescent lights (CFLs) and tube fluorescent lights (like those found in Town Hall and the Town Hall Annex) contain mercury, which is a dangerous element that can poison humans and animals with even the slightest of contact. While they are greatly energy saving products, proper disposal of such semi-hazardous material is key to ensuring a safe living and working environment. Currently, there are programs in our region for recycling mercury bulbs, including Home Depot's CFL recycling program, and Wake County's bulb site in Knightdale. However, there really is nothing of convenience to the citizens of Franklin County, much less Franklinton, which is what prompted the Town to create, for

#### **HOW CAN I CONSERVE WATER?**

You can conserve water (and reduce costs)! A few steps you can take to conserve water include:

- When washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run while rinsing. Fill one sink with wash water and the other with rinse water.
- Run your clothes washer and dishwasher only when they are full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Compost vegetable food waste instead and save gallons every time.
- Wash your fruits and vegetables in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap.
- Shorten your shower by a minute or two and you'll save up to 150 gallons per month.
- Put food coloring in your toilet tank. If it seeps into the toilet bowl without flushing, you have a leak. Fixing it can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Use a water-efficient showerhead. They're inexpensive, easy to install, and can save you up to 750 gallons a month.
- If your dishwasher is new, cut back on rinsing. Newer models clean more thoroughly than older ones.

# Evergreen Cemetery Moves Toward Becoming a Town Cemetery

As you may know, the Franklinton Board of Commissioners voted in 2010 to begin maintenance at Evergreen Cemetery. Evergreen is currently a private cemetery adjacent to the Franklinton Elementary School playground, and is just outside Town limits. The cemetery was created over 100 years ago as a final resting place for our community's African American citizens. At that time, African American citizens were not allowed to be buried in Fairview Cemetery, the official Town cemetery. Since then, Evergreen, its plots, roads, and markers have all been maintained by a committee of volunteers who have for decades raised funds to maintain the cemetery. It is the goal of the Franklinton Board of Commissioners to officially make Evergreen Cemetery a Town cemetery effective January 1, 2012.

Do you own a plot in Evergreen Cemetery? Do you have relatives buried there? Please help the Evergreen Cemetery Committee and the Town staff in identifying those buried and those unfilled plots! It is **imperative** that we have as accurate and complete of a record as possible. Any plots not identified as owned by December 31, 2011 will show in the Town's records as unsold, and therefore, available for sale to residents. The current price for a cemetery plot in the Town of Franklinton is \$800. Thus, it is critical that we have the most complete record as possible.

Franklinton's Adopt a Street program has been underway for nearly two years, and we have lots of streets that are ready to be adopted! So far, ten streets have been adopted, with several more in process. If you, your group, neighborhood, church or business are interested in adopting a street, please contact Town Hall at 494-2520 (x24) and ask for an information packet to be sent to you, or stop by Town Hall to pick one up. First come, first served with respect to street assignments.

What does it mean to Adopt a Street in Franklinton? The process is simple. Visit Town Hall (or call 494-2520 x24) and request the Adopt a Street packet. To adopt a street, individuals, groups, churches or businesses will select a street section (or whole street), and agree to clean that street or street section at least every two months. The initial agreement will be for two years, and you can renew that agreement annually after that. The Town will provide trash bags (two different colors – one for trash, one for recyclables), safety vests and gloves. After each cleanup, the adoptee will be asked to report the cleanup to Town Hall the next business day so that Town staff can pick up the bags.

**Town residents**, a mercury bulb recycling program. This program does not require residents to pay an extra fee or a recycling fee, as many recycling programs do, and is easy to use.

Effective July 1, 2011, mercury based bulbs are no longer permitted in landfills or traditional garbage disposal sites. Town residents who have CFLs that have burned out may bring them to Town Hall during regular business hours (Monday – Friday, 8:30am – 5:00pm) to be recycled. If you have a fluorescent tube light, you may bring it (or them) to the Public Works Department on S. Chavis St. on Tuesdays between 7:00am and 9:00am. Please help us protect your living environment and the residents of our Town by correctly disposing of mercury based light bulbs and using this new Town service!

# HAVE YOU CONSIDERED DRAFTING YOUR MONTHLY UTILITY BILL?

Most every resident in Town has a utility bill. For decades, the Town's policy has been that Town utility bills are due on the 1<sup>st</sup> of the month, are late after 5:00pm on the 9<sup>th</sup> of the month, and if not paid by 5:00pm on the 14<sup>th</sup> of the month, the customer's utilities are cut off. Those policies will continue in the 2011-12 budget year. Want an easy way to not have to remember to get your payment to Town Hall **and** save a little money on postage or gas? Use our bank draft service!

To set up automatic bank draft, bring a voided check to Town Hall, and fill out a brief form. The entire process will take less than ten minutes! It also makes paying your utility bill **much** simpler, because it will automatically be drafted from your checking account on the 1<sup>st</sup> of the month. So avoid the big lines! Set up automatic bank draft today!

Any resident **not currently** on automatic bank draft that registers for it before November 30 will be entered into a drawing for a prize pack including a \$25 gift card to Franklinton's WilcoHess station! The drawing will be held at the September meeting of the Franklinton Board of Commissioners!

## Façade Grants Available from OneFranklinton

In July, *OneFranklinton* and the Franklinton Board of Commissioners awarded the first Façade Grant in our program to **Leslie Martin Pottery** on Main Street! Those who own properties in the historical downtown business district are eligible to apply for a 50% matching grant (up to a \$2,000 reimbursement) to replace, upgrade, or repair the exterior façade of their property. The grants will be awarded quarterly, with applications due mid-quarter on a rolling deadline basis. The final façade grant application deadline for this year is November 30, and grantees will be announced at the January, 2012 meeting of the Franklinton Board of Commissioners.



The program will begin again at the start of 2012 with applications due on February 28, May 31, August 31, and November 30, 2012. Awards will be announced at the regular meetings of the Franklinton Board of Commissioners in April, July, October, and January following the application deadlines, and winners will be notified by mail prior to the public announcements.
