Street Light Modifications

It costs the Town approximately \$60,000 annually to light our streets with the existing placement of our street lights. This prompted the Town Board to organize a committee comprised of selected Board members and Town Staff to inventory all the street lights in town and to conduct a cost analysis to provide the coverage for all areas. As a result of this study, we have realized that there are an abundance of lights along some roads and a shortage along others. Therefore we have developed a plan to maximize the benefit to all of our citizens by redistributing lights in a consistent manner throughout town. This may mean the removal or placement of street lights in your neighborhood. Our Staff has flagged lights that are scheduled to be discontinued with orange rope. If you believe a light in your neighborhood should remain, please contact Tammy Ray at Town Hall at (919) 494-2520. Each call will be taken into consideration and a determination made by the committee. We realize that street lights are important for the safety and welfare of our community and for individuals walking and running along sidewalks at night and we have endeavored to maintain enough to ensure the wellbeing of all our citizens while reducing our cost to provide this service. Please be aware that lights being discontinued by the Town may be continued by property owners at their own expense. You may call Duke Energy at 1-800-452-2777 and request the light to be arranged so that your property remains lit.

You can conveniently recycle the following items :

- <u>Glass</u> glass must be a *food or beverage* container of any color. *Not* accepted are ceramic materials or plate glass: ex. coffee cups, window panes, plates.
- <u>Aluminum & Steel Cans</u> any aluminum beverage containers & steel food cans. Also accepted are *rinsed* aluminum foil or pie plates.
- <u>Newspaper, Magazines & Junk Mail</u> Newspaper & all inserts, magazines with stapled bindings, office paper, cereal boxes, and junk mail.
- <u>Not Accepted</u> large quantities of corrugated cardboard like moving boxes, hardback books, tissue or other paper products.

** Corrugated cardboard can be recycled at local convenience sites **

- <u>Plastics</u> Plastic bottles
 <u>Per</u> & milk jugs
- <u>Not accepted</u> are antifreeze or motor oil jugs, cat litter buckets, butter or yogurt tubs, grocery bags.
- <u>Recycle tips</u>: Rinse containers to avoid insects and odors in the warmer months, <u>Crush plastic and alumi-</u> <u>num containers to avoid your recycle cart overflowing between service days</u>.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT A GREAT SUCCESS!



The Franklinton Police Department held the 22nd annual observance of National Night Out on Tuesday,

August 6. Moving from several block parties to one main event this year brought our entire community downtown to connect with officers and leaders of the Franklinton Police Department. One of the reasons for the consolidation this year was to debut the new Franklinton Community Watch Program. (See more information elsewhere in this newsletter.)

Franklinton is one of the 10,000+ communities nationwide that observes National Night Out. National Night Out is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watches and is an effort to heighten crime prevention awareness; generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs; strengthen neighborhood spirit and police community partnerships; and send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

The event began in Franklinton in 1992 with residents being encouraged to turn on their porch lights and come outside, while officers made visits to as many residents as possible. Participation was so overwhelming that "Block Parties" had to be organized to so that officers could meet more citizens. In 2006, the Town boasted eight "Block Parties" which, to say the least, afforded officers, elected officials, and staff little time for meaningful interaction at each host site. With this in mind, the next year the Town organized one big event which was held at the Franklinton Park. This brought all of our citizens to together at one location and allowed all of our police, fire, rescue and town officials an opportunity to meet and get to know our citizens.

Our community has been very supportive of National Night Out and this event would certainly not be possible if it were not for the gracious volunteers who organize and donate their time for this event as well as our local merchants who donate door prizes. Proceeds from raffle tickets support Police Community Outreach programs. School Bus Safety

As many of us know it is against the law to pass a stopped school bus. Once the Stop arm is up, everyone must stop when driving on a two lane road. As all streets in the Town of Franklinton are two lanes, it is critical that we all obey this law. The safety of our children is at risk. Be conscious of school buses when you are driving, especially during the hours of 6am - 8am, and 2pm - 4pm, as these are the most common times for school buses to travel on local streets.



Keep Franklinton Beautiful ADOPT A STREET

Ever wondered how you can take a small step to keep our community looking its best? Consider adopting a street! Franklinton's Adopt a Street program has been underway for over four years, and there are several streets that are ready to be adopted! If you, your group, neighborhood, church or business are interested in adopting a street, please contact Town Hall at 919-494-2520 and ask for an information packet to be sent to you, or stop by Town Hall to pick one up. First come, first served with respect to street assignments.

What does it mean to Adopt a Street in Franklinton? The process is simple. Visit Town Hall (or call 919-494-2520) and request the Adopt a Street packet. To adopt a street, individuals, groups, churches or businesses will select a street section (or whole street), and agree to clean that street or street section at least every two months. The initial agreement will be for two years, and you can renew that agreement annually after that. The Town will provide trash bags (two different colors – one for

trash, one for recyclables), safety vests and gloves. After each cleanup, the adoptee will be asked to report the cleanup to Town Hall the next business day so that Town staff can pick up the bags.

HOW CAN I CONSERVE WATER?

You can conserve water (and reduce costs)! A few steps you can take to conserve water include:




- When washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run while rinsing. Fill one sink with wash water and the other with rinse water.
- Run your clothes washer and dishwasher only when they are full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Compost vegetable food waste instead and save gallons every time.
- Wash your fruits and vegetables in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap.
- Shorten your shower by a minute or two and you'll ۵ save up to 150 gallons per month.
- Put food coloring in your toilet tank. If it seeps into the toilet bowl without flushing, you have a leak. Fixing it can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Use a water-efficient showerhead. They're inexpensive, easy to install, and can save you up to 750 gallons a month.
- If your dishwasher is new, cut back on rinsing. Newer models clean more thoroughly than older ones.

EMERGENCY SUPPLY KIT

RECOMMENDED ITEMS:

- WATER, one gallon per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- FOOD, at least three day –supply of non-perishable food
- Battery powered or hand crank radio and NOAA weather radiow with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid Kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Complete change of clothing including sturdy shoes
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener for food
- Matches in waterproof container
- Cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger
- Prescription medications and glasses
- Pet food and extra water for pets
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates, paper towels, plastic utensils, and toiletries,

PERMITS REQUIRED

The primary purpose of zoning is to segregate uses that are thought to be incompatible. In practice, zoning is used to prevent new development from interfering with existing residents or businesses and to preserve the "character" of a community. The Zoning Department is responsible for issuing permits to ensure that new structures, additions, uses and businesses are in compliance with the applicable zoning district standards. If you are thinking about building a new home, adding on to your current home, building a garage or storage building, installing a swimming pool or starting business from your home, and are located within the town limits or ETJ (one-mile beyond town limits) please contact the Zoning Department, Mr. Henry Gupton, Code Enforcement Officer for the appropriate permitting requirements. 
UPDATE YOUR INFORMATION
