Mayor's Message...

It's been a long and wonderful road over these last 21 months. (At least it'll be 21 months by the time you read this.) I cannot tell you how happy I am to be serving you in this role. If I had the ability to do it full time, I'd jump at the chance.

While many things that are great news for Franklinton are things that not everyone gets to see, I get to see and know most all of them. For instance, the Town has received a grant of just over \$800,000 – not everyone may understand why that's incredible. Well, I'll share one part of that with you – that grant would allow us to move towards building what's called a 'package plant' at our wastewater regional

pumping station just off South Chavis Street. In constructing this plant, we can take the entirety of the sewage produced in Franklinton on a daily basis (an average of 150,000 gallons a day), and instead of putting what's called the 'gray water' (the cleaned, treated sewer water, which is actually cleaner than the water we drink in some cases) back into Cedar Creek, we can use that water to irrigate local golf courses and provide such water to local businesses that may be able to use it. This gray water would be used *instead* of drinking water...which means that the next time there's a major drought, we've taken steps to protect our drinking water...

ter supplies from being depleted as quickly.



Another nifty example is an event I attended recently in Winston-Salem. Mayor Allen Joines convened a summit of mayors that have a presence of biotechnology industries in their communities. You're likely already aware of Franklinton's – since Novozymes has been a corporate citizen and community supporter since 1979. Novozymes may have changed names since then, but they haven't changed their commitment to being one of the best corporate citizens in the state of North Carolina. At what became the Biotech Mayors Summit on July 29, several mayors and representatives of

towns and cities across the state came together to discuss what we can do as elected representatives to support these industries and work to foster their success and growth. It was noted that for every biotech job, an additional 2.5 jobs are created in the communities that surround them. While representatives from larger cities such as Raleigh, Durham, Chapel Hill, and even Holly Springs spoke about the companies that are within their cities, I spoke about the benefit of being 'biotech adjacent.' Franklinton was by far the smallest community represented – but that mattered little when it came to the conversation. Those at the roundtable were very interested to hear how supportive Novozymes has been to Franklinton and Franklin County, even though they aren't in our corporate limits. Everyone participating agreed that there are many things we can do together to bring a voice to support these companies, large and small, as well as what we can learn from each other. We will continue to meet periodically, to discuss issues regarding being a biotech community. (And some don't even know that Franklinton is one!)

That's just one place in which I get to represent my hometown. I am so proud to be able to do so. I cannot believe how fast time has flown. I also can't believe how much has happened in that time. Also, as you may have read in my blog, I like to attend local events – please let me know if there's an event in your organization, church or school. If I can be there, I'll be glad to! I try to visit and participate as much as possible, but sometimes the schedule of what effectively equates to two full time jobs can be a bit

difficult. I promise – if I can be there, I will! I hope your summer was a fun one, and that you've gotten a great start to your autumn. I wish you the best this holiday season, and always. Please don't hesitate to contact me with issues or concerns...I'm always glad to hear from you!

From Gravel to Green...

The Municipal Pocket Park Project

The Town of Franklinton Tree Committee has been selected to receive a grant for the Municipal Pocket Park project from the NC Division of Forest Resources, Urban and Community Forestry Grant Program. Yes, fellow citizens of Franklinton, this means part of the municipal parking lot on South Main Street will be transformed into a pocket park. The Franklinton Tree Committee's grant request included drawings of the proposed park, a list of trees and plants, a detailed budget, community benefits, and a timeline for completion. The Franklinton Tree Committee was granted \$11,537.00!

As always, there is paperwork to be completed; therefore, work on the park will not begin until the fall. Like most grants, it comes with conditions. Grant monies will pay for soil replacement, soil amendment, and tree purchases. We will be digging up asphalt, removing really bad dirt and replacing it with good soil. The trees to be purchased will be fairly decent sized not twigs. A portion of our Tree Committee budget will cover other expenses such as sod. However the grant does not pay for shrubs, sidewalks, or benches. We are asking the community to support the project by donating "pocket change for a pocket park" and volunteering time or materials. *All* contributions will be happily and gratefully accepted. Donations are tax deductible

Citizen of the Year Nominations



What is the Round Up program? Help Keep Franklinton Clean and Beautiful!

Since April, the Franklinton Adopt a Street program has been underway, and streets are ready to be adopted! So far, two streets have been adopted, with several more in process. If you, your group, neighborhood, church or business are interested in adopting a street, please contact Town Hall at 494-2520 and ask for an information packet to be sent to you, or stop by Town Hall to pick one up. First come, first served with respect to street assignments.

What does it mean to Adopt a Street in Franklinton? The process is simple. Visit Town Hall (or call 494-2520) and request the Adopt a Street packet. To adopt a street, individuals, groups, churches or businesses will select a street section (or whole street), and agree to clean that street or street section at least every two months. The initial agreement will be for two years, and you can renew that agreement annually after that. The Town will provide trash bags (two different colors – one for trash, one for recyclables), safety vests and gloves. After each cleanup, the adoptee will be asked to report the cleanup to Town Hall the next business day so that Town staff can pick up the bags.
