NATIONAL NIGHT OUT 2008



The Franklinton Police Department will hold its 17th annual observance of National Night Out on Tuesday, August 5, 2008. Franklinton is one of the 10,000+ communities that were involved in observing National Night Out in 2007. National Night Out is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watches and is an effort to heighten crime prevention awareness; generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs; strengthen neighborhood spirit and police community partnerships; and send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

The event began in Franklinton in 1992 with residents being encouraged to turn on their porch lights and come outside, while officers made visits to as many residents as possible. Participation was so overwhelming that "Block Parties" had to be organized to so that officers could meet more citizens. In 2006, the Town boasted eight "Block Parties" which, to say the least, afforded officers, elected officials, and staff little time for meaningful interaction at each host site. With this in mind, in 2007, the Town organized one big event which was held at the Franklinton Park. SEWER REHABLITATION

Last October, the Town of Franklinton received a grant from the Clean Water Management Trust Fund in the amount of \$1,033,000. In late June, the Town also received notice from the Rural Center (the North Carolina Rural Economic Development Center) has granted the Town \$338,500 for a total of \$1,411,500.

These funds will be used by the Town to rehabilitate several components of our sewer system around the Town.

What's Your Board Doing?

Over the past few weeks, the Town Board of meeting over many topics pertinent to the Town. In addition to the regular monthly meetings, the Board has met to construct the Town's budget, to determine which streets need to be closed to parking on the street for safety concerns, street decommissioning, water and sewer concerns, and abandoned/junk/nuisance vehicle ordinances. As well, your Board has been vigilant in attending meetings of the County Commission, as well continuing to participate in organizational meetings that the Town is a part of, including CAMPO, the Kerr Tar Regional Council of Governments (or COG), the Franklin County Economic Development Commission, and the Franklin County Committee of 100.

Over the past few weeks, the Town Board of Commissioners have spent several evenings monthly update on the Action Item Report created meeting over many topics pertinent to the Town. by the Mayor from the items determined priorities at the Town Board Retreat in March. Look for this report to track items of importance to the Board determine which streets need to be closed to and the Town.

Budget

The 2008-09 Fiscal Year Budget has been adopted by the Franklinton Board of Commissioners. Please visit www.franklintonnc.us or come to Town Hall to see a copy. The Board voted not to increase taxes, and to restructure utility fees to assist those who use less water in an effort to promote voluntary conservation. These rehabilitative improvements are part of the Town's effort to correct problems with our sewer system that have led to severe infiltration by storm water when we have heavy rains, which cause further problems at the wastewater treatment plant. These improvements would have been required of the Town, and would have caused a serious rate increase on the part of the Town had we not received these grants. Over the next year, you'll see these improvements around town begin.

News from the Franklin County Department of Aging

Call 911 even if you can't reach the phone!

Many senior citizens are at risk of accidents requiring help from emergency services. Any Franklinton resident can get help fast by dialing 911, however, about 100 homes in the county now have an additional device that enables the resident to call for help even when the telephone is out of reach. "I've fallen and I can't get up" is a common plea for help heard by emergency staff. The HASTEN System allows the resident to call for help through a special connecting device which is activated by pressing a button on a pendant worn around the neck.

This system has saved many from lying on the floor for a long period after a fall. The system works 24 hours a day, seven days a week, ready on stand-by to connect the caller with Franklin County 911. This protection is popular with seniors who live alone and may have no one to check on them frequently. Medical, fire, security, and safety emergencies will get an immediate response from the appropriate agency.

The HASTEN System includes a smoke alarm which will automatically notify 911 if smoke or excessive heat is detected in the home. An extra value is peace of mind that relatives receive from knowing that their loved one can get help fast in time of crises. The Franklinton Senior Center works with AC Corporation to obtain and install the systems. Staff of the Department of Aging can install the system within a few days notice of the need, and instruct the person on its use. Monthly rental of the system is \$30.00, with a one-time installation fee of \$50.00. Anyone who wishes to have a HASTEN System installed may simply request it by calling the Franklinton Senior Center, 494-5611.

HIGH SPEED RAIL UPDATE

By now, you may know that there is a planned high speed rail path that will utilize the current CSX railroad tracks. (These are the tracks that are parallel to US 1 and Main Street in Franklinton.) For the Town of Franklinton, this means that the crossings at Pearce Street and North Main, Joyner Street just off North Main, Mason Street just off North Main, College Street just off South Main, Hawkins Street just off South Main, and Cedar Creek Road just off South Main would all be closed. However, the crossing at NC 56 would be upgraded, and an additional lane added to the highway. Also, two new crossings would be added; one would be located just north of the current crossing at Pearce Street; the other would be located just south of the current crossing at Cedar Creek Road.

In April, a meeting of the steering committee was held in Youngsville, which many citizens attended, along with several members of your Board of Commissioners. The Board feels very strongly that these closures would have a high negative impact on the Town of Franklinton. Fortunately, the engineers at the DOT Rail Division are very serious about their commitment to being a partner in the communities which will be affected by this project. The High Speed Rail project of the NC DOT Rail Division is a very important project to the economic development of our state, allowing ease of transport with what will hopefully be a more efficient method than driving. However, while we do see this as a need, and we also recognize that this rail line may also be used in the future to bring commuter rail to Franklinton (this is likely about 15 to 20 years out, and would bring a depot back to Franklinton for the first time in several decades), we

Mr. Foster has remained in communication with Mayor Senter and the Board, ensuring them that the concerns of the citizens of Franklinton are important to the NC DOT Rail Division. The Board will keep you informed as events develop.
